

Ohio State Dominates Three Big Ten Teams

CHICAGO, Today—(UP)—Unbeaten Ohio State, Rose Bowl bound as the Big Ten champion, placed a starting player for every position on the first three All Conference teams selected by the coaches for the United Press.

Three Buckeyes, including the only unanimous choice in the balloting, halfback Howard Cassidy, made the first team. Other Ohio State players on the first team were end Dean Dugger and tackle Francis Machinsky.

Wisconsin and Michigan, who tied for second place, and Purdue grabbed two places each on the first team while the other two spots went to guard Calvin Jones of Iowa and halfback Bob McNamara of Minnesota.

Wisconsin landed its record-setting fullback, Alan Ameche, for the third straight year and also placed center Gary Messner, who won honorable mention a year ago. Ameche, completing his fourth season of varsity play, gained 3,212 yards during his career for a new national collegiate mark.

Purdue's Tom Bettis was the only other repeater on the first team, gaining a spot at guard for the second season, while the other Boilermaker to make the club was sophomore quarterback Len Dawson, who threw 15 touchdown passes during the season.

Michigan placed sophomore end Ron Kramer and senior tackle Art Walker.

The Buckeye domination of the squad showed on the second and third teams as well as on the first. Five Ohio State players, including three backs, Dave Leggett, Bobby Watkins and Hubert Bobo, were on the second team together with guard Jim Reichenbach and tackle Dick Hillinski.

J. C. Caroline Elected Grid Captain At Illinois

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., Today—(UP)—J. C. Caroline, an All-American halfback last year, has been elected captain of the 1955 Illinois football team.

Caroline, a native of Columbia, S. C., was the first Negro to ever be elected Illini captain.

Illinois, after sharing the Big Ten Conference championship in Caroline's sophomore year, failed to win a conference game this year and finished in the cellar.

Jack Chamblin, senior end from Robinson, Ill., was chosen most valuable player. Chamblin was a linebacker and a 6-minute player in most games.

A tie, incidentally, would crown the Steam Rollers as champions.

Penn. Plays Harris

The Tigers can't get out of the cellar in any event, and the Pioneers can't move up very far with a win.

Lebanon Valley Had First Winless Season Since 1910

The 1954 football season was Lebanon Valley's most disastrous in 44 years. Not since 1910, when the Dutchmen lost seven games and scored but 11 points (to their opponents' 259), has the Annville college experienced a winless season.

The past season also marks the first time the Dutchmen have been on the short end of the gridiron win column since 1940, when they won three, lost five.

Coach Ellis McCracken, who bowed into the collegiate circle this year, is not as disappointed with his freshman-laden squad as he was with the varsity team.

"We were essentially a freshman team playing a varsity schedule," said McCracken, "and I think the boys committed themselves pretty well. Next year, I believe we should be able to hold our own."

Lebanon Valley loses only two players through graduation, co-captains George Radanovic of Bressler, Pa., and Dick Sparks of Linden, N. J.

Although the Dutchmen scored but 40 points during the season, six players had a hand in the scoring. Freshman Bob Longenecker of Progress, Pa., who was converted from end to halfback in mid-season, tallied two TD's to tie for scoring honors with junior halfback Dave Bosacco of Glenolden.

Other scorers were freshman quarterback Hank Douglas of Midlestown and Jim Stanfield, junior halfback from Lansdowne, six points each; freshman John Olinger, fullback, Ford City, three points; and sophomore Doug Miller, end, Millersburg, one point.

Joe Stauffer, freshman quarterback from Red Lion, led the team's passers with 272 yards on 32 completions in 81 attempts.

Ross Plasterer, Lebanon sophomore who was converted from fullback to end, led in pass receiving, taking nine tosses good for 123 yards. Bosacco topped the team's rushing with a 37-yard average on nine kicks. Stanfield was the individual rushing leader with 104 yards gained on 32 carries.

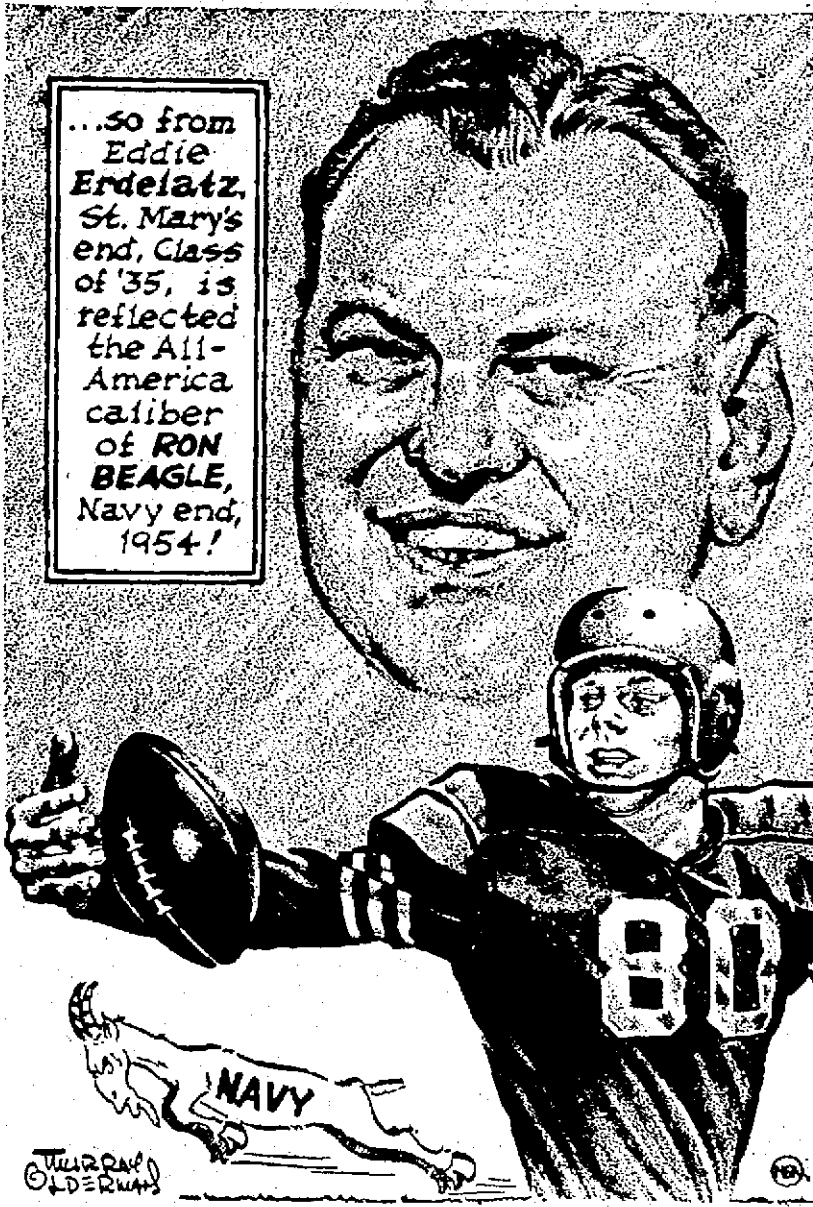
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Army-Navy Tilt Looms As Best In Long Series

PHILADELPHIA—(NEA)—You could start and end a football season at Municipal Stadium, Nov. 27.

That would be, of course, when Army and Navy—both moving along at a thunderous pace—smash into each other before the usual gathering of 102,000 in the vast and gloomy Philadelphia battlepit.

The game itself promises to be, perhaps, one of the very best of the entire series. Army holds a lead, having won 28 to Navy's 22 with four ties. The huge crowd will get a chance to see if Army can build its lead — of if Navy's Eddie Erdelatz still has the big game magic to beat Red Blaik.

In four cracks, Coach Erdelatz has come away with three victories, two of which could be attributed in no small measure to the so-called cribbing scandal at West Point. The Cadets won a year ago going away, 20-7.

The sheer talent which runs through the squads makes this a game to see. No college team gets off its marks any quicker than Army, and Navy isn't far behind.

On the records, it is tough to pick a winner. Army started slowly with what now appears to be an implausible loss to South Carolina. It came back to slam Michigan in a major surprise and followed up with a shocking victory over Duke. After the opener, there was only one scare, the one-point victory over Virginia.

Navy swamped Stanford, among others, but was caught in the middle of Pittsburgh's powerful upsurge before being shaded by Notre Dame, against which the Midlides fumbled away a touchdown on the goal line. The sailors were most impressive massacring Duke.

Talent-wise, this edition of the Army-Navy game figures to be a downright war, with the NEA All-America ends, Don Hollender of the Plain and Ron Beagle, showing the way. Their presence alone produces tremendous interest.

The pass-snatching Hollender and Beagle anchor lines which put on a vicious show. Army sends out a first team with three sophomores up front. They are end Art Johnson, tackle Dick Stephenson and guard Fay Goodwin, forming the left side. On the other side of a senior center, Billy Chance, the Cadets have guard Ralph Chesnakus, a big bruiser out of Brockton and as tough and rough as Rocky Marciano, and tackle Godwin Ordway and Hollender, the speed boy.

The Army backs spin around Pete Vann, the slick fader and devastating passer. Vann's long passes to Hollender have been knockout drops. When not moving by air, Army's ground attack goes by yardage. Tommy Bell could be the best college back in the country. Sophomore Bob Kysky is all back and gives the soldiers a kicker. Mike Zeigler, Johnny Wing, Pete Lash, Pat Uebel and Dick Murland give Earl Blaik more inside and outside get-up-and-go.

The key to the Army attack, despite this frightening array of backs, is Vann.

Offense

Navy's offense, which reached its heights with a 40-point drubbing of Duke and some 60 points rolled up against Columbia, features a quarterback George Welsh's passing.

Operating behind Welsh will be a fleet of quick-starting backs. Bill Heworth, Bob Craig, Jack Garrow, Dick Guest, Joe Gattuso and Johnny Weaver give Earl Blaik more inside and outside get-up-and-go.

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Junia Third Nationally With 15-Game Streak

HUNTINGDON, Pa. (UP)—Only the 18-game victory string of the mighty Oklahoma and Tennessee State's 17-in-a-row today surpassed the 15-game victory record of Little Junia College, which last Saturday closed its second consecutive season without a loss or tie.

This central Pennsylvania co-ed school fielded a team with little or no bench strength, an "out-modern" offense and a high-scoring fullback who weighs only 158 pounds.

In the national undefeated, untied standings, Junia ranked third this week with Trinity of Texas, which also has a 15-game streak covering two seasons.

Junia's record included victories over Ohio State and 43 over Oklahoma, both of which have been dogging U.C.L.A. in the ratings for the past four weeks. Ohio State, which wound up an unbeaten season and won a bid to the Rose Bowl, was the first-place choice of eight coaches, while Oklahoma, with a 9-0 record and one game left to play, was the top pick of four.

Notre Dame, which retained fourth place, attracted the only other first-place vote in this week's ratings.

The coaches will vote on the final 1954 ratings after next Saturday's games, which involve seven teams among this week's top 10.

U.C.L.A. swept through its nine-game schedule with a scoring average of nearly 41 points per game. Despite its impressive record, however, the Bruins are ineligible for the Rose Bowl because they played last year. The Rose Bowl berth went to Southern California, which dropped from sixth to 13th in the ratings after being trimmed by U.C.L.A.

Army, which meets Navy in the annual classic at Philadelphia Saturday, ranked fifth once again, keeping the order of the top five teams exactly the same as last week. Navy and Mississippi each moved up one notch to sixth and seventh, respectively, followed in order by Wisconsin, Arkansas and Miami (Fla.).

Wisconsin and Miami were the week's newcomers among the top 10, both returning after an absence of a few weeks. Both advanced five places from the previous week. Arkansas moved up one place, even though it was upset 7-6 by Louisiana State last Saturday.

Southern Methodist, like Southern California, dropped out of the top 10.

With points distributed on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 scale for votes from first to 10th place, here is how the top 10 lined up: U.C.L.A. 332, Ohio State 304, Oklahoma 289, Notre Dame 236, Army 186, Navy 126, Mississippi 109, Wisconsin 82, Arkansas 45 and Miami 40.

Baylor headed the second 10 teams, followed in order by Michigan, Southern California, Maryland, Penn State, Duke and Southern Methodist. Rice and West Virginia were tied for 18th, and Georgia Tech and Wichita were tied for 20th.

Denver, L.S.U., Auburn, Texas Tech and Virginia Tech were other teams that received points in this week's voting.

Good Injury Record

"We had no injuries all season until the sixth game when we played Grove City," Hicks said. "I don't doubt whether there was luck. All the boys reported in excellent physical condition and that's insurance against injuries."

"Well, seven of the eight teams we played used some form of the T," he replied.

Ray Kreider, halfback and co-captain, was honored as the "Player of the Year" by his teammates, and rated as one of the best backs in the conference. He was Hershey's standout running back all season.

The Rev. W. Sheldon Blair, pastor of Derry Presbyterian Church, and Hershey Fire Company chaplain, presided as master of ceremonies.

MONTREAL (UP)—The Montreal Canadiens displayed a few some concentration of firepower today with four of their sharpshooters bunched at the head of the National Hockey League scoring parade.

A trio of "Flying Frenchmen," Bernie Bock, Maurice Geoffrion, Maurice Richard, and Jean Beliveau, were one-two-three at the top of official league scoring statistics released today for the first 20 games of the season. Hard on their heels was teammate Ken Mosdell, last year's all-star center off to his best start in years.

Geoffrion set the pace with 24 points on 18 goals and eight assists. Richard, Beliveau and Mosdell had 21, 20 and 17 points respectively.

Detroit's impregnable Terry Sawchuk took over the top spot among the netminders with a 1.67 average.

UCLA Tops UP Ratings For 5th Straight Week

NEW YORK, Today—(UP)—U.C.L.A., having completed the first perfect-record season in its football history, topped the United Press ratings today for the fifth straight week, and now awaits next weekend's wrap-up games for approval as 1954 national champion.

After finishing their season with a resounding 34-0 victory over Southern California to clinch the Pacific Coast Conference title for the second year in a row, the Bruins were chosen No. 1 by 22 coaches on the 35-man United Press rating board.

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KC, Pittsburgh Steal Show At Player Draft

NEW YORK (UP)—Fans of the Kansas City Athletics and Pittsburgh Pirates may not have much to cheer about after the 1955 baseball season starts, but they can be proud today of their teams' showings in the annual major-league player draft.

The A's, living up to new owner Arnold Johnson's "money is no object" rebuilding promise, bought the largest number of players in the draft—three pitchers—and enthusiastically shelled out \$35,000 for them.

The Pirates picked only one player, outfielder Robert Clemente, but as usual General Manager Branch Rickey was a real "bargain hunter" and paid only \$4,000 for the highly touted "sleeper."

All told, there wasn't much action in the annual talent grab bag—only 10 of the 16 teams bothered to make selections and the total purchase price of the 13 players picked was only \$122,500.

There is always a chance that the total may grow, for teams have until midnight tonight to make additional selections.
