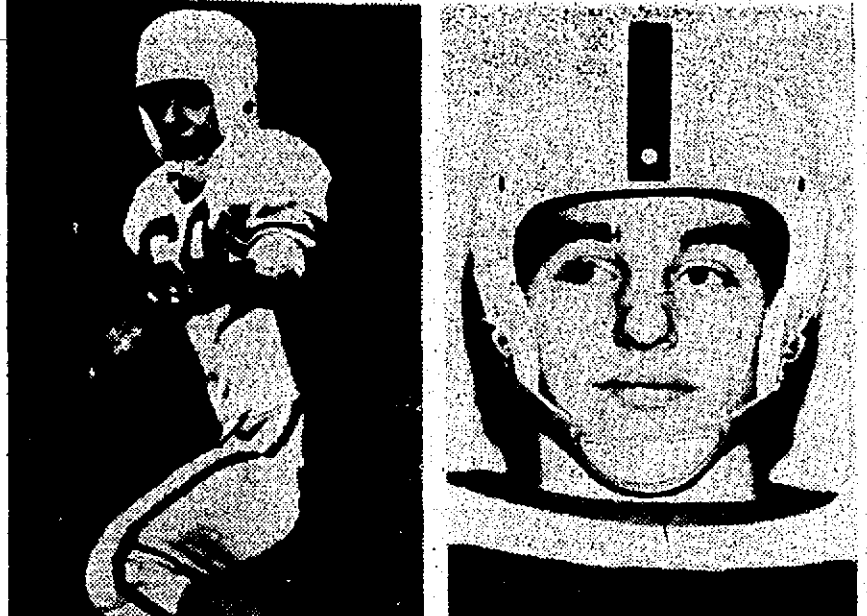


Guyer, Marinkov Top Scorers On Gridiron

Catholic High End Edges Lebanon High Back By One Point To Lead Local Area Gridders — Both Had 12 Touchdowns

Bill Guyer, Lebanon Catholic High's outstanding end, was the top scorer of all Lebanon area football teams during the season which ended last week.

The six-foot, 185-pounder from Hershey scored 73 points on 12 touchdowns and one extra-point to barely beat out Mickey Marinkov, Lebanon High's star back, who had 72 points.

Guyer was one of the main cogs in the Lebanon Catholic eleven which posted a fine 8-2 record for the best mark in the history of the local school.

He was very effective on end-around plays and had more speed than the regular Beaver backs. He also was an excellent pass receiver and caught a number of passes for touchdowns. To show his versatility he was an outstanding performer on defense and did all the punting for the Beavers.

Without a doubt he is the finest end turned out at Lebanon Catholic since football was started there in 1949.

Marinkov ran for 12 touchdowns this season to up his total to 27 for three years of football. Twice he returned kickoffs for TDs and he was a threat to go all the way every time he had the ball. The Lebanon scabbard, however, played in only nine games.

He was the fourth and last of his family to play for Lebanon High and didn't miss a game in three years.

Layne Shoots For 100th TD Pass In NFL Battle

DETROIT, Today —(UP)— Quarterback Bobby Layne of the Detroit Lions can become the third player in National Football League history to complete 100 scoring passes during his career with one touchdown toss today against the Green Bay Packers.

Layne, now in his eleventh season as a pro, ran his touchdown pass total to 99 Sunday as he passed for two scores in Detroit's 21 to 17 victory over the Packers at Green Bay.

Bobby will shoot for the coveted century figure and try to engineer the defending champion Lions to within one triumph of their third straight Western Division title in today's holiday battle.

If successful in his bid for a 100th scoring pass, Layne would join two of football's all-time greats — Sammy Baugh and Sid Luckman — as the only passers to reach triple figures.

Both Baugh, who completed 187 scoring passes in 16 seasons with the Washington Redskins, and Luckman, who passed for 139 touchdowns during 11 seasons with the Chicago Bears, have retired.

Another feature of the Detroit-Green Bay rematch will be Doak Walker's attempt to take over the league's scoring leadership. Walker has scored 81 points this season and trails pace-setting Bob Walston of Philadelphia by only six points in that department.

Walker, the scoring champion in 1950, has scored four touchdowns for the Lions this fall and added eight field goals and 33 extra points. The Lions, who hold a comfortable two-game lead over their nearest division rival, have been installed as 16-point favorites despite the closeness of Sunday's contest.

Three Holdovers On Cage Squad At Annville High

Annville High School's defending county scholastic basketball champions will start the 1954-55 campaign with only three holdover varsity dribblers from last year's title winning team. All are seniors.

Coach Harold Brandt's varsity cage squad also includes five other seniors who have had previous junior varsity experience and some taste of varsity competition, and is rounded out with four juniors who have also had some Jayvee experience.

Returning Lettermen
The three returning lettermen are Gene Fortna, 18, who stands five feet, ten inches; James Moyer, a six-foot 17-year-old, and Carl Flickinger, the smallest player on the squad at five-seven who is also 17 years old.

The other five seniors, all 17-year-olds, are: Robert Clark, 5-8; Ray Clements, 5-11; Lester Fry, 5-9; Karl Miller, 5-10, and Glenn Neidigh, 5-8.

The four juniors, aged 16, are: Tom Lyons, 5-10; Larry Miller, 5-8; Robert Rhine, 6 feet, and Ellis Wolfe, 5-8.

This squad is being groomed with the hopes of retaining the county title won by the 1953-54 Little Dutchmen who also made a creditable showing in the post-season District Three Class B tournament.

Following in the footsteps of that crack 1953-54 quintet posse, a gigantic task for the new Little Dutchmen, however, as last year's champs waded through the Lebanon County Scholastic League with twelve straight wins without a loss.

They posted a phenomenal 17-3 season record in losing only to Middletown and Hershey High while splitting with Swatara Township, and subsequently defeated both Columbia and Newport in District Three play. The Little Dutchmen bowed out of the district title tourney in the semi-finals in losing to Mount Penn by a 56-53 margin.

They will open a 20-game schedule, ten at home and twelve in Lebanon County Scholastic League play, on December 3 at Hummelstown, and will launch their home campaign on December 7 with Hershey High.

SIGNS WITH ROSES
Herb Finkelstein, flashy Lebanon Valley College forward of the past four seasons and 1953-54 co-captain, will try his hand at the sport professionally this season. It has been reported that he has signed to play with the Lancaster Roses of the Eastern Professional League, and is expected to be in the Lancaster lineup for the season opener on Sunday, November 28.

Three Local Area Teams Have Winning Seasons

Lebanon High's jayvees, Lebanon Catholic and Palmyra were the only local area teams to turn in winning football records during the season just completed.

The eight scholastic elevens along with Lebanon Valley College won 33 games, lost 35 and tied nine. This is far short of last year when the same teams rolled to 52 victories while tasting defeat only 19 times and tying five games.

The top team this season was the Lebanon High jayvees who went through the season unbeaten in seven games. Last year the Cedar Twigs had a 5-3 record.

Next in the line are Lebanon Catholic's Beavers who had their best season in the history of the local school. Coach Ed Sheehy's club wound up with an 8-2 record to better the 1953 mark of 4-3-1.

The only other team finishing in the black was Palmyra. The Palms won six games and lost four which isn't as good as last year when they hung up an 8-1 record. Palmyra was the highest scoring outfit, however, with 193 points.

Lebanon High is another outfit that fell below the 1953 pace. The Cedars, with their first losing season since 1948, won three games, lost four and tied two. Last year Lebanon had a respectable 7-3-1 record.

Henry Houck is another team that slipped. Although the Golden Eagles won the city junior high championship for the fourth straight year, they had a losing season with a 3-4 mark. In 1953 Coach Harry Matala's crew lost only once in seven games.

Milton Hershey won only two games this year while losing four and tying four. Last season the Spartans were on the winning side with a 6-2-1 record.

Harding Junior High, with two wins, four setbacks and one stalemate, didn't quite match last year's record of three triumphs and four losses.

The Hershey High Trojans, who were the only unbeaten team in '53 when they won eight games and tied one, had tougher sailing this season and copped only two victories while going down to defeat six times and playing two ties.

Another team that slipped considerably was Lebanon Valley. The Dutchmen, with a green team, failed to win in seven starts compared to last year's 5-2 mark.
