Two pass interceptions — one for a direct touchdown run—and a spectacular 58-yard scoring run from scrimmage. highlighted the first Hershey High win of the season last night at the Hershey Stadium-a 20-6 victory over the Pal-

It was Hershey's first win in three starts, two at home to date, and their sixth in their eight-game series with the neighboring Palms.

At the same time, the loss was Palmyra's first in three season outings, only one at home, and for the third straight year a Palmyra win streak was ended in the annual game

Upwards of five thousand fans saw a Hershey team display marked improvement over its first home showing to crash the win column for the first time this season.

Pre-game and halftime entertainment was provided by the two school bands, massed for the pre-game show, and then divided to present separate half-time musical marching routines.


